BE A RUCKUS YOUTH

Christus Vivit. A post-synodal apostolic exhortation of Pope Francis, on young people, faith and vocational discernment, written in response to the Fifteenth Ordinary General Assembly of the Synod of Bishops, held in Vatican from 3 to 28 October 2018. It is addressed to young people and to the entire people of God. This is the only papal document that had gone through a long list of preparations. This document is the result of several stages of process, namely, Lineamenta, online questionnaire for all youth, International Research Seminar, Pre-Synod, Instrumentum Laboris, Synod and Final document of the Synod (proposals). Among these, online questionnaire, International Research Seminar and Pre-Synod are unique features of this Synod. The document is the outcome of the world Synod of Bishops on "Young People, the Faith and Vocational Discernment".

"Dear Young people, don't observe life from a balcony. Don't confuse happiness with an armchair, or live your life behind a screen. Whatever you do, do not become the sorry sight of an abandoned vehicle! Don't be parked cars, but dream freely and make good decisions. Take risks, even if it means making mistakes. Don't go through life anesthetized or approach the world like tourists. Make a ruckus! Cast out the fears that paralyze you, so that you don't become young mummies. Live! Give yourselves over to the best of life! Open the door of the cage, go out and fly! Please, don't take an early retirement" (CV 143). The Pope continues: "Young people are not meant to become discouraged; they are meant to dream great things, to seek vast horizons, to aim higher, to take on the world, to accept challenges and to offer the best of themselves to the building of something better" (CV 15), "Everyone is born as an original, but many people end up dying as photocopies. Don't let that happen to you!" (CV 106). If you see a priest at risk, because he has lost the joy of his ministry, or seeks affective compensation, or is taking the wrong path, remind him of his commitment to God and his people, remind him of the Gospel and urge him to hold to his course. In this way, you will contribute greatly to something fundamental: preventing these atrocities from being repeated (CV 100). You have worth; you are not insignificant. You are important to him, for you are the work of his hands. That is why he is concerned about you and looks to you with affection. "Trust the memory of God: his memory is not a 'hard disk' that 'saves' and 'archives' all our data. His memory is a heart filled with tender compassion, one that finds joy in 'deleting' from us every trace of evil" (CV 115). He does not keep track of your failings and he always helps you learn something even from your mistakes. Because he loves you. Try to keep still for a moment and let yourself feel his love. Try to silence all the noise within, and rest for a second in his loving embrace.



LETTER FROM THE SUPERIOR GENERAL - 3

Dear Camillian confreres, health and peace!

fter my last communication of 6 February of this year, I would like to update you once again on my current state of health.

With great feelings of gratitude, I would like once again to thank all and each one of you for your feelings of nearness to me during this very demanding stage of my life: visits, telephone calls, call and messages have enriched my days constantly with peace and hope.

After the recent meeting of the Camillian Charismatic Family of 10-14 March 2019, and the meeting of the major Superiors of the Order of 14-18 March 2019, both of which were held in Rome, trusting in my overall stable condition and supported by the pathway of therapy that has been prescribed to me over recent months, I left for São Paulo (Brazil): my country where my parents and my confreres of my Camillian Province live.

The programme was to celebrate the solemnity of Easter with my relatives and confreres and then return to Rome, to the generalate house, in order to continue my activities connected with the government of the Order, in harmony with my confreres who are the other members of the General Consulta, and above all accompanying the preparations for the next General Chapter which will be held in May 2020.

The medical doctors and specialists of our famous St. Camillus Hospital of Pompeia (São Paulo) have always remained in close and continuous contact with the health-care workers of the Madre G. Vannini Hospital and with the cancer specialist of the Umberto I Polyclinic of Rome. Ten days ago, the surgeons of the St. Camillus Hospital decided to engage in a laparoscopy: I am now in convalescence, with great peace of mind, at the Camillian community of Cotia (São Paulo).

In the light of this new situation, my medical doctors also

prudently assessed the change in my protocol of therapy: the suspension of the current treatment with bio-molecular drugs and the beginning of so-termed immunological therapy, which is also available in the Brazilian health-care context. This new protocol envisages a series of four infusions at regular intervals of three weeks to be administered at a day hospital.

This sudden change at the level of therapy as a result, and necessarily, also changed my diary: my new pathway of treatment suggested that I should stay in São Paulo, at least for the next three months.

However, as the proverb has it, 'every cloud has a silver lining'. Here in São Paulo in recent days I have been able to open my pastoral visit to the Camillian Province of Brazil, which for some time had been planned for this month of May. Fr. Laurent Zoungrana (the Vicar General) and Br. José Ignacio Santaolalla (a member of the General Consulta) are beginning their journey of listening in all our communities of Brazil. In September, once again in São Paulo, there will be the international meeting of all 'our works' of the Order – I will also be able to be present at this event which is important for the development of our ministry.

Our journey together continues...

With a profound sense of gratitude for the human and spiritual solidarity that you have demonstrated towards me, I send you my greetings, trusting in the care for my life and my health offered by expert health-care workers and in the intercession of Our Lady of Health and St. Camillus.

Seeing God Face to Face

The inspiration for this ministry is from St. Camillus de Lellis himself, our founder and example, who followed JESUS so closely in the Kingdom ministry through personal suffering and through his exemplary imitation of JESUS' compassion for the sick.

Surprising is the love of the Lord every moment! Words find themselves chocked within to proclaim His deeds. Peniel, the centre to care for the illness of the souls, is a retreat centre at Mananthavady, began in the form of a prayer house intended to provide space for personal prayer for individuals and groups. Envisaged by the community led by Fr. Sojan Koonanickal to bring people closer to JESUS, the Healer, Peniel began to provide the space for small groups or individuals for personal prayer, group spiritual activities like retreats, recollections and the like. In course of time the Lord is making it to grow according his plan. In the year 2017, this centre extended its ministry for laity as well by initiating charismatic retreats.

Inspired by our age old dictum "Preach the Gospel and Heal the Sick", our Provincial Fr. Baby Ellickal and his council dared to venture into this new expansion of ministry. Thus, Peniel - through all its ministries - embraces the vision of our charism of holistic healthcare with special attention to the spiritual health of the people. It now serves as a centre for spiritual growth and enhancement of the people of God who believes in JESUS and who wants to come to know and believe Him.

It is a new and innovative ministry initiative for Camillians in India. Even though retreats and inner-healing spiritual

exercises are common in Kerala, for us Camillians it is a new venture all-together as we are able to open the doors of our charism - of caring the sick persons with Christ's compassion - to the spiritual realm of the society. It is extending our hands with more hearts to the suffering flock. Breaking open our horizons of ministry beyond the physical care and mental well-being, our charism expresses its original spirit with real Christian momentum in its affirmative.

Why going so Strange?

Why at all spiritual activities for the general public – even to those who are not apparently 'sick'! Does our charism leave open such a door anywhere? This was my personal struggle in the initial years of practicing spiritual ministry of preaching and the related. In course of time the Lord taught me the mystery of suffering that is present in every human existence. It is not only in the hospitals and counselling centres that we find, console and heal the sick. So genuine we find them in spiritual venues too as in these cases. I have personally experienced that in the faith brimming cultural context of India, it is more likely that we have better and easier access to the suffering flock in spiritual ministry. There we encounter persons' mental, physical, social and spiritual sufferings.

In the Footsteps Jesus and St. Camillus, our Founder

The inspiration for this ministry is from St. Camillus de Lellis himself, our founder and example, who followed JESUS so closely in the Kingdom ministry through personal suffering and through his exemplary imitation of JESUS' compassion for the sick.

Jesus' Kingdom ministry was enfleshed through his preaching and works of signs (miracles). Most of his ministry, as all know, was around the sick and the suffering. Jesus' human compassion was triggered by the divine intention! His compassion to the sick and his interventions in their lives were not only oriented for their physical well-being; rather, through such physical experiences he intended to open their hearts to the Father by the washing in the 'Siloha' which He Himself is. His intervention in the suffering of the man born blind (St. Jn 9:1-39) was ultimately aimed at opening the man's inner eyes of faith by revealing Himself as 'the Son of Man' (vv. 35-38). The healing was His invitation to believe in Him for the right vision of life! Imitating Jesus' compassionate care for the sick and suffering, no Camillian can go blind toward this divine intention. Genuine Camillians ministry reaches to the core of the kingdom value - Eternal Life, i.e., salvation of every soul.

St. Camillus, who cared for the sick with Christ's compassion, approached every suffering person holistically. He was so diligent to care for their physical, mental and spiritual well-being. He always had a deep desire for the salvation of the souls of whom he cared for physically. Fr. Cicately, a contemporary of our founder, reports that St. Camillus spent hours before the Holy Eucharist, and thus inspired by the Lord, he could grasp the spiritual status of the souls of the sick under his care nearing death. He used to rush to such persons to remind them of their miserable sinfulness and prepare them for a genuine confession and for good death. St. Camillus also used to visit persons in their homes and urge them for a change of heart. Turning their hearts to Jesus, delivering them from the evil influences and assisting them to come out of their struggles in faith, he served not only their body, rather more vigorously their souls in view of their total well-being.

Peniel is an attempt - by interpreting his spiritual zeal in the present age - to look into the spiritual aspect of human existence. So that through spiritual and inner healing a person is reinstated even into his physical well-being.in the light of the Word of God and catholic teachings we as Camillians attempt also to empower the suffering ones mentally and spiritually to accept the reality of suffering as a channel of God's grace and a means of sanctification.

In Fact...

I remember a man attending the retreat in Peniel thrice, and while asking him what made him to return to our centre repeatedly, he shared his experience of a 'spiritual resurrection': he was a person far from JESUS and was fully broken in mind and in wealth, full of bitterness toward a person who deceived him, unable to forgive! The first retreat

gave him grace and convictions to return to spiritual life and getting boosted up he wanted to grow in grace by which lot many of his difficulties vanished.

An old lady of above 70 years surprised us by her testimony of having been healed physically of her certain abdominal and bowel difficulties and to our surprise we found her back for another retreat bringing some others too with her! There are live testimonies of people coming to hope breaking through depressions mental breakdown due to financial crisis, blocks to getting married and so on. We have also felt the strong intercession of St. Camillus during the retreats because we find the sick getting physically healed. May the Name of JESUS, the healer be glorified!

The Name and our Ministry

The name Peniel, meaning 'the Face of God', comes from Gen32:30, where Jacob wrestling with the angel of God, realizes God's presence. 'So Jacob called the name of the place PENIEL saying, "For I have seen God face to face, and yet my life preserved" ' (Gen32:30). Through the Psalmist the Almighty commands us to seek His Face (cf Ps 27:8a) and with the psalmist all those who love the Lord respond: 'My heart says to Thee, "Thy face, LORD, do I seek" '(Ps 27:8b). So this name has been taken from this supreme command of the Lord and the inner-most thirst of every soul to seek the Holy Face of God and to speak to him face to face as with a friend (cf Ex 33:7-11). People loaded with spiritual and psychological burdens and physical sickness are welcome to this place of spiritual communion with JESUS to experience his compassionate healing touch through the listening to the Word of God, participating in Eucharistic Adoration, Spiritual Sharing, Spiritual guidance and psycho-spiritual counselling.

Peniel aims at

Through Peniel and its ministries, we aim at helping people to grow in JESUS, the wounded healer. Thus we try to participate in the healing ministry of JESUS by realizing our charism through the ministry of holistic health by preaching of the Word and through other spiritual ministries. Moreover, we envisage to help them to understand that suffering is not sign of God's negligence over them but expression of His love and a channel of His grace. In addition, Peniel is a Camillian attempt to let the people experience the Kingdom through spiritual, psychological and physical healing and consolation. Peniel hopes to empower human race to understand the mystery and value of suffering which is inevitable for one's sanctification and salvation. We share in the meditation of our founder on the Christ crucified and prepare ourselves and others to participate in the mystery of the Cross.

Present activities

- Personal prayer days / personal retreat by religious and priests
- Monthly residential charismatic retreat (usually begins on the evening of the first Tuesday of every month and ends by the night on Friday of the same week)

- Retreat and seminars for our formees
- Seminars/prayers gatherings by other catholic spiritual groups

Activities We Envisage:

- Residential spiritual retreats with special reference to the mystery of suffering
- Popularizing Marian Devotion motivated by St. Camillus' special love for the Blessed Virgin
- Ministry through media (print media, social media and the like)
- Spiritual guidance and psycho-spiritual counselling
- One-day spiritual conventions
- Out-reach spiritual ministries

I am thankful to the Almighty for the whole hearted support of the Provincial and his council, my superior and the confreres

of my community and from other communities who assist at the centre, Daughters of St. Camillus who volunteer to assist at the centre and laity from Camillian Family and other volunteers. Frs. Lijo Pattathil, Reji Kaithaparambil, Jofree Nakkuzhikkattu, Teji Anickattuvayalil and Bobin Eanthumkal render their whole hearted co-operation in preaching the Word, Sacrament ministries, Spiritual Sharing/guidance and psycho-spiritual counselling. Peniel has been an experience of our Lord's care for our new step of ministry and the community's collective responsible involvement. Our mother province too was so benevolent to water and manure this new branch of ministry through prayers, encouragement and financial support. Presently, Peniel can accommodate 26 persons (including the volunteers) for a residential program and 100 persons for the nonresidential. All glory ever be to the Almighty!

A developing Mission

ganda is a mission of Anglo -Irish province started in the year 2000. Indian province began to collaborate with the Anglo - Irish province in 2010. Johnson Vellachira, (Late) Shibin Arppathanath, Russel Tharappel, Biju Elenjickal and Jofree Nakkuzhikkattu have contributed remarkably for the development of this mission. The formation program in Uganda is now guite settled and stable. thanks to the selfless services of Indian missionaries here in Uganda. The fruits coming out now are the result of their hard work.

The Ugandan mission has now two perpetual professed members, two temporary professed members, five novices, fourteen philosophy students and seven orientation students. Within one year, we will have four Ugandan Camillian priests, and five temporary professed members. At present there is one community having three Camillians including me and a diocesan priest helping in the formation.

Ministry

We have a small health centre attached to the seminary, where about 400



patients visit in a month. Weekly visits are made by the medical team to the neighbouring villages. We are also involved as chaplain in one of the hospitals. We do collaborate with the parish in celebrating mass in four sub- centres of the parish whenever possible.

Future Plans:

1. To start theology in Uganda. At present theology students are sent to Tanzania for their studies. From this year we are planning to have the theology studies here in Uganda with a Camillian formator from Tanzania, thanks to the generosity of Tanzanian delegation and German Province.

- 2. To start a small day-clinic in Musoli, where we have a piece of land, 15 kilometres away from the present community.
- 3. To develop the farm land (140 acres) for the future financial support.

I hope that within a maximum of five to seven years, Uganda can become an independent delegation.

Every one of us is a wounded healer, thus the good news is that we are healers because we are wounded. Pastoral care plays a vital role in the lives of the sick. Thus. following the example of St. Camillus we shall try to move on to love our charism with new enthusiasm and vigor. We wish to be a living offering of love, a song of thanksgiving made of humble and silent service to the poor, the most abandoned with simple gestures full of compassion and Mercy.

The workshop on Camillian charism and spirituality was in fact a great time for all of us to turn back and look at the way we travelled in practicing our charism.



Updates on Northeast Mission

s per the decision of the Provincial Chapter to begin a mission center in the Northeast, the present administration has taken the lead and had a meeting with the Archbishop of Guwahati; and during this meeting that the Archbishop gave us the official permission to begin a community for formation and for ministry in the Archdiocese of Guwahati, Assam.

In view of realizing this mission project, I have been sent to Guwahati. I was appointed as Assistant Vicar at Mattia, one of the parishes of the Archdiocese of Guwahati in 2017. Well, initially it was difficult to set-in, mainly due to the different cultures, attitudes and languages. It was challenging and demanding moments for me as I was getting enculturated into the Northeast. Meanwhile, I was also seriously studying the culture and the different possibilities of venturing into the land of Northeast with our mission of healthcare ministry.

Finally, last year, we purchased a piece of land in Bandhapara, near Rajapara (70 km away from Guwahati town) about 1 acre and 65 cents (St. Camillus House, Bondha para, Rajapara Post, Kamrup Dt., Assam, +918310967459). We have just done earth filling for some portion of the land for the construction purposes. We are still waiting for some civil documents to get done in order to

begin the construction work.

However, the future vision for the northeast is: To build a small community for the mission in the Northeast; to promote more vocations from the different States of the region (in fact, we already have promoted a candidate from here); to develop a small community health clinic for the poor people in the villages, to promote collaborative ministry with the Archdiocese of Guwahati and the other diocese of Northeast in terms of health animation and healthcare training programs and to help in the pastoral care ministry in the parishes and hospitals.

The current position of the mission is this: I will be relieved from the parish by the end of August 2019 and will dedicate my full time for this mission project. We have opened a Bank account and applied for electricity connection. Fencing the boundary is going on. We require to dig a borewell later in the course of time. We are just waiting for the official documents to be acquired and then, we will proceed with the construction of a building for the community. I am given a car for the use of this mission and I will be staying with the Capuchin fathers at Rajapara.
