We are called today, in the words of theologian Elizabeth Johnson, to be subversive sages, compassionate healers, social prophets and founders of a revitalization movement. I think our lives can be considered meaningful and our discipleship worth the cost, if people who meet us, irrespective of their background.





LETTERS FROM THE GENERAL CONSULTA

Dear Camillian confreres,

We are living in very intense days with our faith in the Lord Jesus, with our common fraternity and personal emotions, due to the aggravating illness of our superior general Father Leocir Pessini and his subsequent death, which took place on July 24, 2019.

The very touching participation during his funeral on July 26, 2019, highlighted the esteem and affection to the person and work of Father Leocir by various pastors of the Church, the religious of the Order, his many friends, and loved ones.

In the light of this event, we wish to convey to each one of you our utmost and heartfelt sentiments of esteem and gratitude to the intimacy, warm fraternity and the unanimous prayer that you have raised to our Lord of Life, first, by asking healing of Father Leocir, then after the announcement of his death in suffrage of his soul and of course for the good of our Order.

We wish to express our profound gratitude to Father Antonio Mendes Freitas together with the confreres of the Camillian Province of Brazil and to their physicians and healthcare collaborators for the warm welcome, constant care with utmost competence accorded to Father Leocir in an exceptional way during the last months of the treatment and therapy.

The family of Father Leocir - dad Laurindo, mom Therezinha, sisters Salete, and Bernadete – has been a constant presence and a point of reference in his life, especially during this period of illness. Their discretion and dignity in which they have shared their affection and suffering remain a great example that we preserve as a precious heritage of the Pessini family.

Although shaken by this recent event, the journey of the general government of the Order continues. On the 27th of July 2019, during the Consulta meeting, Father Laurent Zoungrana, Vicar General of the Order, as mandated by our Constitution, took over the mandate of Superior General of the Camillians, pronouncing the Profession of Faith.

A discussion on the topic, which is dear to all the religious - the forthcoming general chapter – was undertaken. We have decided to forward to the Congregation for Institutes of Consecrated Life and Societies of Apostolic Life the request for the derogation of the rule contained in Article 102 of our Constitution which says that, "the vicar general announces a general chapter within three months of the office falling vacant and convenes it within six months, but not beyond that period of time" to be able to celebrate the general chapter following our customary date on May 2, 2020. However, we submit to the resolution of the Holy See. Furthermore, within a short period, we will give you an adequate notice on the election of the new general consultor (cf. Const. 102).

Trusting in the intercession of our holy Father Camillus, and your fraternal collaboration, kindly receive our cordial greetings!

Dear Camillian Confreres,

Over the last two weeks, since the death of our Superior General *Fr. Leocir PESSINI*, we have received numerous expressions of Christian condolences and fraternal nearness from both the confreres of our Order of Camillians and from various Church and civil institutions that over the years have appreciated him as a person and his role as a Camillian religious. Amongst them all, we wish to point out to you the telegram that Cardinal Pietro Parolin, the Secretary of State of the Vatican, addressed to Fr. Laurent Zoungrana, our Vicar General, communicating the condolences and the prayers of the Holy Father, Pope Francis.

This nearness helps to animate our Christian hope and comforts our journey as the general government of the Order.

At the meeting of the General Consulta of 9 August 2019, in Rome, we proceeded to some appointments as envisaged by our Constitution (Const., n. 102) in our situation of the office of Superior General being vacant.

Unanimously, the General Consulta:

- Elected Fr. Felice DE MIRANDA a new member of the General Consulta of the Order.
- Elected *Fr. Gianfranco LUNARDON* the new *Procurator* of the Order (with the title *Pro-Vicar General*).

As we had already informed you in our last communication of 27 July of this year, we immediately sent a request to the *Congregation for Institutes of Consecrated Life and Societies of Apostolic Life* (CIVCSVA) for a derogation from the rule contained in article 102 of our Constitution which envisages that 'The vicar general announces a general chapter within three months of the office falling vacant and convenes it within six months, but not beyond that period of time' in order to be able to celebrate the General Chapter as already planned, starting on our most 'customary' date, namely 2 May 2020.

The CIVCSVA, by the rescript prot. n. 45028/2019 of 1 August 2019, signed by His Excellency the Most Reverend Msgr. José RODRÍGUEZ CARBALLO, the Archbishop-Secretary, derogated the time limit laid down by our Constitution n. 102 (P. IV, chap. II) and granted the dispensation to celebrate the General Chapter starting on 2 May 2020, following usual practice.

Grateful for your friendship and cooperation, above all during this stage of the preparations for the General Chapter, and trusting in the intercession of our Saint Father Camillus and in your fraternity, cordially we send you our best greetings!

SAINT JOSEPHINE VANNINI

Foundress Of Daughters Of St. Camillus (1859 - 1911)

osephine Vannini who hailed from Rome is the first woman saint in the healthcare ministry. It is from here that even today her daughters set out to various health care activities with flourishing missions in 22 countries of the world.

Judith was born in Rome, on 7thJuly 1859 to Angelo Vannini and Annunziata Papi and was baptized as Judith Adelaide Agatha on the following day. Young Judith, orphaned by both parents at the age of seven was given shelter in the Conservatorio Torlonia, run by the Daughters of Charity of St. Vincent at Siena. She abandoned herself completely to God and sought her way of life in prayer, meditation and spiritual direction under the guidance of Fr. Angelo Mondini of the Congregation for Missions. Meanwhile, Judith obtained a diploma to teach in the nursery school and was engaged herself in instructing the little ones.

As Judith was inspired to a virtuous life by the Daughters of Charity of St. Vincent, the charity of Christ soon impelled her to offer herself entirely to God.

Judith had tried twice to enter the same institute but for reasons of health she was refused admittance. She felt lost, while all her hopes seem dashed until God extended his merciful hand to help this faithful soul, who had never ceased to place her trust in him.

In December 1891, Judith met Fr. Louis Tezza of the Ministers of the sick at a spiritual retreat where she sought his advice in a confessional to discern the will of God for her. Fr. Tezza, who had a long cherished dream to establish a female religious congregation who would dedicate themselves to the care of the sick felt at that moment a light from high and an inner voice which said to him 'could not this young woman be the




soul chosen by God to give life to the work which He had entrusted to him?' Fr. Tezza then shared with young Vannini of his plan and asked her if she felt disposed to collaborate with him. After several weeks of discernment Judith accepted Fr. Tezza's request and in March 1892, she and two companions received the Scapular and Religious habit of the Camillian Tertiaries. She took the name Josephine and was made the Superior general of the

Daughters of St. Camillus on 8th December 1895.

The Spirit Of Mother Vannini

Mother Vannini was gentle, lighthearted caring and firm. She was herself an example of fortitude, brimming over with energy and always full of optimism. She often said...... "What greater Holiness can there be than to fulfill God's Holy will cheerfully and in complete submission?" In



moments of difficulties she would instruct her sisters to repeat the ejaculation.... 'In Te Domine Speravi, (In You I trust, O Lord). Everything hinged upon her constant harping with the sisters and the sick alike on the need for doing everything for the love of God. The Love of Jesus and the giving of self are the means for a Daughter of St. Camillus to attain perfection, dedicated as she is to the salvation of souls. Such a message was both the beginning and the end of Mother Vannini's ascetics through which she still lives among us today.

Birth In Heaven

During these years, Mother Vannini suffered a severe heart disease, but she neither avoided hardships nor neglected her responsibilities, but committed herself totally to the spread of the institute and the spiritual formation of the sisters. Fatigue had sapped her strength and the illness caused her to stop all the good works she had in mind. It was on the morning of 23 February 1911 that her blessed soul took flight to her eternal abode. She was beatified on 16thOctober 1994 by Pope St. John Paul II. From being a "Daughter of Charity", she was destined to become the "Mother of Charity", in the words used in the decree of opening of the apostolic process on her life of Heroic virtue.

Pope Francis has formally announced in the ordinary public consistory of cardinals on the causes of canonization – a new star will be added to the firmament of the saints on 13th October 2019. In fact, Bl. Josephine Vannini (1859 - 1911), the foundress of the congregation of the Daughters of St. Camillus will be canonized on that day along with four other Blesseds.

Charism Of The Daughters Of St. Camillus

The charism of the congregation is a specific one supported by the fourth vow to serve the sick even at the risk of one's own life according to the Spirit of St. Camillus. God caused this tender young plant to thrive and blessed it in its pursuit of good works, but not without subjecting it to many trials,



which even threatened to rend it apart. Today the sisters are engaged in various fields of health care apostolate, such as: Hospitals, Dispensaries, School & College of Nursing, Homes for the aged, Institutions for Mentally and physically challenged children, Leprosy colonies, and Homes for people affected with HIV/AIDS. Today the mighty work of God and the sacrificial life of our sisters have made it possible to expand the special charism and spirituality of St. Camillus in four continents, six provinces and three delegations. This co-operation and help among the members of the Institute, create unity, better understanding, more knowledge and an occasion to transmit the real spirit and visions of our Founders in the various field of actions the Congregation has undertaken at this present time.

The address of the provincial was followed by the presentation of the finance by the provincial bursar Bijoy Kuliraniyil. He emphasized the need to use the utmost carefulness in management of finance and comply with the stipulated government regulations. Superiors of each community presented the reports of the respective communities. The presentation of all the communities was followed by a general discussion.

Pastoral Healthcare Leaders In Asia Meet

Meeting of Camillian Pastoral Healthcare Leaders in Asia-Pacific region was held from 12th August to 14th August 2019 at Camillian Pastoral Care Centre, Bangkok. The 3-day meeting was organized by the General Consulta to discuss about the relevance of formation in the Pastoral Healthcare Ministry in the Post-Camillianum era as Camillianum is to be closed in September.

The Provincial Superior of Thailand Fr. Rocco, during the Holy Mass, welcomed the participants. Fr. Aris Miranda represented Fr. Leocir Pessini, the Late Superior General to give the opening address, pinpointing the interest and hope of Fr. Leo about the future of Pastoral Healthcare in Asia-Pacific. Fr. Aris gave the keynote address, inviting all to reflect on the three questions: why are we here, what are we to discuss and how are we to proceed? He said, "Our responsibility is to look into these realities with twofold tasks: 1) Aspire, and 2) Create leaders with humility to use the arms of St. Camillus, to reach out to others to create leaders in their turn, leading by examples.

After the introductory talk of Fr. Aris, different pastoral care leaders from different countries presented their report on their Pastoral Health Centres. Pastoral care leaders from Philippines, Thailand, India, Indonesia, Vietnam, Australia and Taiwan came up with presenting the reality, practice, challenges, scope and hope of pastoral care ministry in their respective countries. Their presentation brought out an overall reality of Pastoral Healthcare and the need to prepare Camillians and other priests and religious with training and formation.

After the report presentations, we moved to some input sessions. Fr. William Eronimoose from India gave the talk on "Culture of Playing God leading to Culture of death: Bioethical issues and pastoral implications in Asia." Presenting various ethical issues, he underlined the relevance of Bioethics Education for the pastoral care leaders. After that, Fr. Mathew Perumpil from India spoke about the Catholic Healthcare Directives, the basic guidelines to be followed in the Catholic Hospitals, as there are no guiding directives in such hospitals. He brought about the need

to prepare the pastoral care-givers in these directives. Fr. Aris spoke about the relevance of care of the earth based on the document Laudato Si, which should help all to love, to respect, and to care for our common home.

Fr. Arnaldo Pangrazzi spoke on the Pastoral Health Care and the relevance of education of the same. He underlined the fact that Service to the sick is integral part of the Church. While taking care of the Corporal works of mercy, the holistic healing should take place, with the mission of seeing Jesus in the sick and being Jesus for the sick. He brought about the specific objectives of pastoral healthcare training with various forms of application and the need to involve others to be trained in Pastoral health care.

After the in-put sessions, there were group discussions and their presentations. The group discussions were centred on different priorities. Of these priorities, top-three priorities have been chosen: formation in pastoral care ministry, collaboration among the provinces in Asia, and advocacy.





Manage well to serve better

Lema Garcia, Episcopal Vicar, Sau Paulo, Brazil presided over the Holy Eucharist. The national hymn of Brazil was sung after the Holy Mass in a creative manner and Fr. Antonio Mendes Freitas MI, Provincial Superior, Brazil welcomed and the opening message was delivered. It was followed by the General orientation on the Economy at the service of the Charism and the Mission of the Institute by Jose Ignacio Santaolalla MI, General Bursar. In the following days we were enlightened by various speakers from different countries and there were also group discussion and question answer sessions after each sessions. The Brazilian Model of Administration and Management of Health Care Institutions were informative and moving.

On the fourth day, the guided tour to the Camillian Hospital and University was edifying and inspiring. The Holy Eucharistic celebrations were arranged in different languages on each day. Pilgrimage to the Sanctuary of our Lady of Aparecida, Brazil brought joy to the participants and the Solemn Eucharistic Celebration was presided over by Archbishop Dom Orlando. He preached on St Camillus and appreciated the service of Camillians to the Church at large. Thousands of pilgrims participated in it. I could pray for the great family of Camillians and in a special way for Camillians India, being in the Sanctuary of our Lady of Brazil. I could also offer prayers at the tomb of late Superior General Fr. Leo Pessini.

The new School of Charity...

The Camillian call to "heal" is not meant to be limited merely to the administration of the sacraments in hospitals and home for the aged. "Heal the sick" is the mission of the Divine Healer. His healing interactions were neither based on any particular traditions, nor limited to any particular Institutions.

eal the sick and preach the gospel. No doubt, it is the foundation of the Camillian life. The Camillian vocation to the healing ministry was always limited, mostly in Europe, to the hospital or old age home chaplaincy. Many of the European Camillians are sceptical about their members working in the Parish. The bearers of the red cross working outside the hospital walls is still a taboo in Europe.

The main conflict factor is the tradition. St. Camillus lived in a time in which the salvation of the soul of the sick person was given more importance than his physical, psychological and emotional needs. Due to the poor medical advancement, the chance of getting cured was very narrow. In the hospital many sick people waited with certainty for death instead of getting back to normal life. As the chances of survival was very low, many of the patients admitted in hospitals were preoccupied with their life after. Out of fear of not inheriting the heaven, if they die without receiving the last anointing, the priests were in high demand. Therefore, the hospital chaplains were meant mostly to meet the sacramental needs of the Sick. Administration of the sacraments were considered prior to medical care. Irrespective of their physical conditions, the patients were compelled to the reception of the sacraments. Even the physically exhausted patients were woken up at early hours of the day for the daily holy communion. To prevent the non-baptised infants ending up in

"Infant purgatory" they were baptised on the same day or on the following day after their birth. (Those days the Infant survival was a high-risk). To make sure that every soul reaches the paradise, anointing of the sick was administered to every dying patient. Due to the uncertainty about the cure and survival of the Patients, many were even given the last sacrament at the hospital entrance even before they were admitted into the hospitals.

The Camillian ministry grew up under this tradition. In a period of 450 years, some theological thoughts have changed; the Medical science has advanced and the physical diseases are better treated. Psychic and mental needs of a sick person are given equal importance as his spiritual needs. Healing is understood as holistic. Health is defined not just the absence of diseases but as the balance

of a person's body, mind and soul.

"Heal the sick" is the core of the Camillian mission. The Camillian call to "heal" is not meant to be limited merely to the administration of the sacraments in hospitals and home for the aged. "Heal the sick" is the mission of divine healer. His healing interactions were neither based on any particular traditions, nor limited to any particular Institutions. Center of his attention was the Person who was longing for healing. Therefore, Jesus was present where the sick people were present: in their own homes healing of Simon Peter's mother in law (Mark 1,29- 30); on the road-side healing of the man with leprosy (Mark 1, 40-44); in private houses- healing of paralyzed man (Mark 2, 1-5); on the lake side- healing of the possessed man (Mark 5, 1-15); in public places- healing of the woman with bleeding (Mark 5, 21-




34); on his way- healing of the deaf and mute man (Mark 7, 31-36); in the market-place - healing of the blind man (Mark 8,22-26); in the place of worship - healing of the crippled woman (Luke 13, 10-13). His healing mission had no boundaries.

Moreover, his healing methods were holistic and not simply sacramental. He cared for the mind, body and soul of the person. That is very evident in the healing process of the man with leprosy (Mark 1, 40-44). In the first step of healing Jesus shows sympathy to him. Jesus opens himself completely to this leper. In the second step, Jesus stretched out his hand to the person with leprosy and touched him. We don't touch usually ugly things. By touching him, Jesus want to assure him that his body is not ugly. Jesus wants to make the leper certain about his dignity. In the third step, Jesus tells the leper his desire for him: "I am willing, be clean!". Through his words, Jesus shows him his unconditional love, which heals the leper from the leprosy. In some other healing incident, Jesus cared only for the psychic suffering of a person. In the healing of the man possessed by the demon (Mark 5, 1-20) we find an example for this.

The modern psychotherapy may call this man possessed by the demon as a borderline patient or as someone who suffers under multiple personality disorder. Jesus asks him a very important question: "What is your name?". With his question Jesus wanted to make him aware of his problem: Loss of identity. He does not know any more, who he is. That is why he replied: "My name is Legion, for we are many." Jesus healed him by bringing him to be in touch with his self.

Sometimes Jesus brought healing through forgiveness of sins. "Take heart, son; your sins are forgiven (Mathew 9, 1-2)". Jesus' encounter with the paralyzed man was purely spiritual. A Person's misleads can lead him even to paralysis. Forgiveness of sins can make him righteous again.

The healing of Jesus was always comprehensive. The whole person, the body, the mind and the soul were important for him. He knew the integration of mind, body and soul. Through physical healing, he healed

mind and soul of the sick. Through healing of the soul, he brought healing for the mind and body of the person. Jesus met number of such People who required healing everywhere on his way from Galilee to Jerusalem. St. Camillus followed mostly the spiritual aspect of the healing ministry of Jesus. He focused more to the hospital settings as it was the large meeting place of the sick people.

People who seeks healing are to be found everywhere. Many of them live in their own homes, suffering from anxiety, stress, dissatisfaction, defamation and distrust. Immaturity, bitterness und incapability to forgive each other leads to conflicts. Many conflicts end up in divorce and separation, which causes psychic pain of isolation. People live in conflict with themselves due to their disability to forgive themselves for the mistakes they have committed. People who find it hard to accept their physical figure, their partner, their family, their professional achievements, lives constantly in inner conflict. They suffer from broken relationships. Disappointment with God, faith and church causes spiritual isolation, and pain. Many of these personal ailments leads to depression, which is a common disease in Europe.

A person who suffers under mental agony or spiritual pain, may not always come to the hospital. They may not even visit a psychologist or a psycho therapist. They suffer alone in their homes. They live isolated in the society not being able to maintain stable and lasting relationships. Working in the parish is the easiest way to reach them. As a priest, you have a better chance to win their trust. Gaining the faith is the first step of reaching them. As a priest, you have the freedom to visit them at their homes. If they find you as a trustworthy person, they will take you to their inner world of disturbances and suffering.

After 12 Years of hospital chaplaincy in different hospitals in Austria, I am working in the last 2 years in a parish. In the parish where I live and work, I meet many people who are in need of healing. Unlike in the hospital, it is easier for me here in my parish, to come in contact with people and their suffering - not just physical but a number of areas where they are deeply wounded and in need of healing.

It is the living of the Camillian Charism that differentiate a parish priest from a Camillian priest. The vocation as a Camillian is not determined by the place of the work, moreover, it is characterised by a person's openness to the people who seek healing, his competence as a messenger of the healing ministry of Jesus, his professionalism as a health-care person and his love and dedication for the Camillian charism.

Yes, it is the newness of the old "new Scholl of Charity" even to be involved in the parish ministry, because it is the very nature of the Camillian vocation to be present wherever people are suffering and seek healing.





CTF reaches out to the flood victims of Wayanad



erala is recovering from a major flood, exactly a year after it was hit by another one. While last year's floods were described as a once-in-a-century calamity, this one was an ecological disaster waiting to happen. It was right on our part, the Camillian Task Force, along with the Diocese of Mananthavady, many religious Congregations and a good number of volunteers and friends, to show solidarity with our badly affected brothers and sisters in the districts of Wayanad and Ernakulam.

We could reach out in six ways: 1) Organizing Medical Camps: CTF Organized Medical Relief Camps from 12th to 17th August 2019 at different villages of the District of Wayanad. Our Medical Team consisted of 5 medical doctors, 8 nurses, 10 counselors and 17 healthcare volunteers. We could conduct 24 Medical Camps and extend our medical services and treatment to more than eight hundred flood victims in various places. 2) Distribution of relief materials: Through kindness and remarkable generosity of our benefactors and well-wishers, particularly, the Decathlon and its staff and the Daughters of St. Camillus, we could contribute new clothes (bathing towels, bed sheets, blankets), utensils, food grains (rice, dal, cooking oil etc.); sanitary items (soap, tooth brush/ paste, sanitary pads) to hundreds too. 3) Cleaning of the Houses/Buildings: We sent our personnel to the affected areas to help them in cleaning or repairing their houses. Our seminarians were actively involved in it under the leadership of Fr. Lijo Pattathil MI, Fr. Christopher and Bro. Albin. 4) Relief Camp for the affected: The door of St. Camillus seminary at Mananthavady was open to the people who were directly affected by the flood.



5) **Psycho-Social Support to thousands**: Our trained psychologists and social workers were active during this flood with their sense of compassion and empathy. They could listen to the cry of the poor victims, being with them and accompanying them in their traumatic experience of this tragedy. They could, to certain extend, console, comfort and support them and encourage them to go ahead with a sense of hope in the future. 6) **Rehabilitating people who lost everything**: It is through the help of benefactors and collaborators of CTF, we decided to rehabilitate two families who lost everything, by building two new houses for them.



Snehatheeram extends its services to the sick at their homes

Anma is the out-reach program of Snehatheeram. It reaches out to the sick, at their homes and workplace through their various activities. Nanma is the machinery with which Snehatheeram extends its service to those sick who are not admitted to the care and support centre. The following is the detail of some of the services carried out by Snehatheeram through Nanma.

Various Services of NANMA

Home/workplace visits: there are around 150 families of HIV infected persons and people with chronic illness that are directly under the care of Nanma. These families are visited regularly on monthly basis, they have been given monetary help for treatment, medicines and other household needs.

Counselling: an average of around 55 hours of counselling is done on a monthly basic most of which comprises of post-test/ follow-up HIV/AIDS counselling. This is done either at Ernakulam general hospital, Snehatheeram or at the home of the HIV infected persons.

Health and Hunger concerns: Medical and nutritional support is also provided to these families. There are about 10 families who get milk and food kit regularly through Nanma. Another 25 families get other nutritional care such as regular supply of rice and groceries. About 30 patients are regularly provided medicines and more than 50 patients occasionally receive support to meet their medical expenses. Support for lab expenses for scanning, mammography and dialysis have been availed to a few patients on a monthly basis.

Awareness programmes: Around 15-20 awareness program are conducted annually, on HIV/AIDS, hygiene, cancer prevention, rehabilitation, parenting and family wellness.

Patient Liaison: Patient liaison is also done by Nanma by helping the patients get organizational and departmental services such as pensions, grants, nutrition and Karunya fund. Nanma arranges for the patients to be taken to hospital to determine the level or extend of their disabilities to avail them with pension. The families of the deceased are helped to get the death certificate from Panchayaths. When orphan kids are transferred from one institution to another Nanma helps them obtain the necessary certificates. Cancer and kidney patients are helped to get the necessary certificate to claim for Karunya fund.



Ambulance service: an average of 10 ambulance free service is provided by Nanma monthly for patient transportation. Legal aid:when there is case of the abuse of women or children, legal aid is facilitated for the victim through Nanma.

Education support for poor children: Poor children especially HIV affected or children of cancer patients are financially supported by Nanma for their education. In the current year, around 30 students received support.

Network: this is done mainly to raise funds for poor patients. Generally merchant association, employees of shipyard, panchayaths, anganwadies, schools and St. Vincent De Paul society are part of this network who regularly help poor patients and their family through Nanma. Network is also done with centres which shelter destitute and orphans. This year 8 patients have been send to other care centres through Nanma.

Blood donation campaign: an average of 5 camps a year have been conducted under the auspices of Nanma. About 150 patients got benefit this year. Mainly cancer patients are the beneficiaries. From June 2019 to August 2019 around 51 patients have received blood.

Kesadanam: around 600 people have donated their hair this year. The hair is handed over to Amala Medical College, Thrissur. Manufacture and distribution of wig to cancer patients happen there.

Self-help group: Two persons have been given loan to start a small business. Two girls have been financially helped for their marriage. One person was helped to build toilet.

The celebration was coupled with a simple farewell ceremony to Fr. Mathew Perumpil, who had been instrumental in actualizing Snehagram. The provincial Fr. Baby Ellickal was also present during the celebration. A cultural programme organized by the residents added colour to the event.

The feast was celebrated at St. Camillus college, Janampet on July 17. The provincial Baby Ellickal was the main celebrant of the Holy Mass, in which the community of the Daughters of St. Camillus also participated.

The feast of St. Camillus and Annual Day of Snehasadan were celebrated on July 20. The thanksgiving Eucharistic celebration was presided over by the bishop of Mangalore Peter Paul Saldanha, in the presence of Fr. Baby Ellickal, many religious and priests, well-wishers, benefactors and neighbours.

The feast was celebrated with great devotion and fervour in a special and spiritual way at Snehatheeram community at Aluva on July 15. Fr.Vijil Kizakkarakkattu Oprem, the director of Eceo Jeevana, Athani, Ernakulam was the main celebrant and Fr. Shaju Vadakkel, Oprem superior of Eceo Jeevan delivered the homily. After the Holy Mass, the new Ambulance of Lay Camillian family was blessed.
